## Strike Lane Covid-19 'Catch up' Premium

In June, a £1 billion fund for education was announced by the government. Further guidance has now been released (https://www.gov.uk/guidance/coronavirus-covid-19-catch-up-premium) showing that the money is split between a catch-up premium and a national tutoring scheme.

The catch-up premium is funded on a per pupil basis at £80 per pupil. This will be based on the previous year's census and will not include Nursery numbers, meaning Strike Lane Primary School will be in receipt of £14,800 (185  $\times$  £80). The spending of this money will be down to schools to allocate as they see best. To support schools to make the best use of this funding, the Education Endowment Foundation has published a support guide for schools with evidence-based approaches to catch up for all students.

## Payment schedule

Schools will get funding in 3 tranches Autumn 2020 – this is based on the latest available data on pupils in mainstream schools. Early 2021 – based on updated pupil and place data. This payment will also take account of the initial part payment made in autumn 2020 so that schools will receive a total of £46.67 per pupil or £140 per place across the first 2 payment rounds. Summer 2021 term - a further £33.33 per pupil or £100 per place.

## **Covid Funding Update and Impact**

? Covid funding has been used to provide an extra 0.5 teacher in Y6 throughout the year to support children in continuing to make good progress from the end of KS1

- 17 children across Y1-Y4 received Fast Track Phonics Intervention twice per week taught by Miss Forshaw and Mrs Kershaw – 88% of these children continued to make expected progress in their reading and 24% made above expected progress despite many being home schooled during the lockdown period. Fast Track Phonics ran throughout this time.
- 20 children throughout Key Stage 2 took part in Reciprocal Reading Groups with TA's who had been specifically trained in this intervention. This also continued throughout lockdown for those children who joined the Zoom meetings. 95% continued to make expected progress in their reading and 20% made above average progress. All children were able to speak about how the sessions had helped them to understand vocabulary and the text better through smaller discussion groups and had become more confident in reading aloud.
- 3 EAL children received 15 x 1 sessions per week from the 1-1 Tuition scheme.
   This has yet to be completed and impact shown via the programmes assessments. From in school data all children showed expected progress in reading with 1 showing above expected progress. In writing 2 showed expected progress, 1 being above expected and 1 had not maintained the progress he was expected to.
